TRADITION EIGHT

Alcoholics Anonymous should remain forever non-professional, but our service centers may employ special workers.

ALCOHOLICS ANONYMOUS will never have a professional class. We have gained some understanding of the ancient words "Freely ye have received, freely give." We have discovered that at the point of professionalism, money and spirituality do not mix. Almost no recovery from alcoholism has ever been brought about by the world's best professionals, whether medical or religious. We do not decry professionalism in other fields, but we accept the sober fact that it does not work for us. Every time we have tried to professionalize our Twelfth Step, the result has been exactly the same: Our single purpose has been defeated.

Alcoholics simply will not listen to a paid twelfth-stepper. Almost from the beginning, we have been positive that face-to-face work with the alcoholic who suffers could be based only on the desire to help and be helped. When an A.A. talks for money, whether at a meeting or to a single newcomer, it can have a very bad effect on him, too. The money motive compromises him and everything he says and does for his prospect. This has always been so obvious that only a very few AA's have ever worked the Twelfth Step for a fee.

Despite this certainty, it is nevertheless true that few subjects have been the cause of more contention within our Fellowship than professionalism. Caretakers who swept floors, cooks who fried hamburgers, secretaries in offices, authors writing books--all these we have seen hotly assailed because they were, as their critics angrily remarked, "making money out of A.A." Ignoring the fact that these labors were not Twelfth Step jobs at all, the critics attacked as A.A. professionals these workers of ours who were often doing thankless tasks that no one else could or would do. Even greater furors were provoked when A.A. members began to run rest homes and farms for alcoholics, when some hired out to corporations as personnel men in charge of the alcoholic wards, when others entered the field of alcohol education. In all these instances, and more, it was claimed that A.A. knowledge and experience were being sold for money, hence these people, too, were professionals. -Providence Point

- August 1945- The Grapevine carried Bill W's first article (titled Modesty One Plank for Good Public Relations) setting the groundwork for his 5-year campaign for the Traditions.

FROM THE VIGE CHAIR SAN-ANTONIO INTERNATIONAL

The First International Convention celebrating AA's 15th anniversary was held in Cleveland, Ohio in 1950. Highlights included Dr. Bob's last appearance and message before the fellowship, and "the confirmation of our Twelve Traditions by the Convention as the permanent platform of unity and function on which our fellowship would henceforth stand." (AA Comes of Age, p. 213) An estimated 3,000 members were in attendance.

AA's 75th anniversary International Convention was held July 1-4, 2010 in San Antonio, Texas. GSO estimated 53,000 members, family and friends attended making it the largest such gathering to date. While no noteworthy resolutions were passed, the event was nevertheless a remarkable and historic affirmation of the AA program, message and fellowship.

For those who couldn't be in San Antonio, I hope some of you availed yourselves of the online access to the opening flag ceremony, a particularly moving celebration when we consider the state of the world today. Other convention events included marathon AA meetings, an Old timers meeting (members with 40+ years in recovery including the most senior with 63 years), hospitality suites, dances, and a great range of topic meetings throughout. The positive energy on the streets and in the rooms was compelling.

We would like to give our thanks to the GSO staffers and others who made our 13th International Convention possible. The next International will be held in Atlanta, Georgia, 2015. Start saving your pennies.

Closer to home, the annual Nassau Intergroup Picnic was held on July 18. We would like to give our thanks to the members who worked hard before, during and after the picnic to make it enjoyable for the rest of us. It is always important when attending such an event to remember that we are in public, and as such, may be seen as representing AA as a whole. What impression of our fellowship do we give?

Next month I will be reminding members of the challenge I put to the local fellowship back in November to confirm each group's wheelchair accessibility. We didn't get much info back in response to that, in fact, we didn't get any. I'M AN ALCOHOLIC

And my name is Jimmy. I'm 61 years old and have not had an alcoholic drink since Sep of 97. At a recent Big Book meeting, we read the words "after a few years with an alcoholic, a wife gets worn out, resentful, and uncommunicative." These words caused me to reflect on my once married life that I treasured so. We were married in 85 and I got sober 12 years later, and only because of my wife's ultimatum.0 Booze had defined my life for over 30 years. But am I an alcoholic? No way! Well, long story short, I put the cork in the jug, and after 2 years or so, stopped going to meetings, stopped calling my sponsor, stopped acting sober. Complacency set in, resentments stayed with me like an unwanted house guest. Control issues abounded. Then something happened. The woman, whom I adored and treated like a princess, had had enough. She left me, our daughter, her family and friends. This was 4 years ago. I may never know what finally made her decide to leave, but I am sure that 21 years of living with an alcoholic, active & recovering took its toll. I have made my amends with her, and took responsibility for my part in the demise of our marriage, which despite my alcoholism, was a good one. This brought me back to meetings 4 years ago, and this time I'm doing it for myself. Adversity has been my constant companion since she left. I miss that life terribly. I'm hurting emotionally and financially, but I don't drink, and I go to meetings regularly. And, with the grace of God I know that I cannot and will not drink. The fellowship of A.A. has taught me that there is nothing worth drinking over, ever! I know that I will never be able to drink successfully. I am a very grateful alcoholic despite these rough times, and am extremely grounded in my sobriety. God bless
